<b>Minor</b> REVISION comments	<p>This is a nice article dealing with ethnocentrism and global impact on herdsmen menace in Nigeria. I very much enjoyed reading this piece. I would suggest the authors just to make a few adjustments to the article:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. At the moment the paper does not have a clear-cut delimitation between introduction and literature review. It should be inserted a section entitled 'Literature Review' before the third phrase of the paper.</li> <li>2. In the introduction authors should explain international importance of their research and their contribution to the theory of ethnocentrism and global identity.</li> <li>3. I would suggest the authors to add some references to the concepts of global identity versus 'glocalisation'. There are plenty of literature on debating this issue (see R Robertson's works, Eric Swyngedouw 2004 etc).</li> <li>4. The role of identity was also studied in other similar studies, see the issue of identity of shepherds: O'Brien, T, Cretan, R (2019), The role of identity in the 2015 Romanian Shepherd Protests. <i>Identities: Global Journal of Culture and Power</i>. Doi: 10.1080/1070289X.2017.1400322</li> <li>5. On page 3, authors stipulate that: 'Psychologically, it is instructive to note that persons displaced during the crises may tend to internalize the conflict approach to interpersonal interaction'. For this assertion there were previous studies showing this issue, so a citation could be placed here, please see: Vesalon, L., Cretan, R., (2012), 'Development-induced displacement in Romania: the case of Rosia Montana mining project, <i>Journal of Urban and Regional Analysis</i>, 4(1), 63-75</li> <li>6. Conclusions looks very short. I would suggest limitations of the study, suggestion for further research, and recommendations to be merged in the section Conclusion.</li> </ol>
