Editor's comment:

The manuscript is interesting and the findings will be important for a broad readership event though avocados are well-known for their antioxidant properties.

- 1. Careful spell and grammar checks. An example is the word supraoxdine in Line 14 (abstract) should be replaced by superoxide
- 2. In the methods section, authors should at least briefly describe how the experiments were done instead of just citing previous works.
- 3. The title of the line graphs should be written in a way that a lay reader should understand the data presented. Authors should clearly mention that they presented % change compared to control instead of bluntly saying that dose-dependant effect. What was the unit of measurement for the line graphs (likely the %c to i from the table)?
- 4. The authors have never mentioned the significance of using lead acetate in their study. For experts in the field, this may be alright but they need to explain to the readers why they used lead acetate and why it is important. This is extremely important and add more value to the data presented.
